

The Artifact

More Than a Sign

"J.M. Humes, Gold Lettering, The Gold lettering on the directory slab and on the office doors of the Kirby Building is handsome and well executed. Mr. Humes is an expert in this work and has built up a solid reputation for designing and executing signs of all kinds, for besides making signs upon glass he designs and manufactures all kinds of high-grade sign work."

-The Saginaw Evening News, April 8, 1909.

Early signs from businesses are rare. Outdoor signage is subjected to sunlight, rain, wind, hail, snow--the list could continue. If miraculously they survive the elements, it is unlikely they will withstand the onslaught of changing fashions and outlive the business they once announced. The sign above the entrance to Myer Brothers Jewelers is a rare survivor. Since 1914, it has graced the front entrance announcing—"Myer Brothers – Diamonds – Watches." For an impressive 110 years the sign has held its place of prominence. This includes 65 years at the store's original location at 111 S. Jefferson Avenue, and since 1979, the year the interior of the shop and sign were donated to the Castle Museum by Robert and Marian Shear, in the museum's gallery.

The sign is decidedly low-tech, but elegant. Fabricated from the commonest of materials—a pine board, applied wooden letters, black paint and gold leaf (not including the sizing and ground that were used to adhere the gold leaf)--its beauty lies in impeccable craftsmanship. Often the contributions of the artisans remain anonymous. However, this sign is proudly—and exquisitely—signed in gold-leaf, "J.M. Humes & Son"



When John M. Humes passed away in 1946, his obituary noted he was "one of the dwindling clan of pioneer residents who knew Saginaw as the lumber queen of the Midwest and who sailed the Great Lakes in lumber barges of that era. . " His obituary details his career on the lakes and then recounts:

He was born here March 19, 1861, and after his youthful career as a Great Lakes sailor, learned the sign-lettering craft. He opened his own shop in 1888, continuing until his retirement in 1940." (*The Saginaw News*, January 3, 1946.)

At the time he created the Myer Brothers' store sign, Humes' shop was located at 406 Germania [now Federal] Avenue--about the current location of the Castle Museum's Annex. By 1921 Humes' firm moved to East Genesee and advertised "Gold Signs a Specialty." William Humes, the son in the title, noted that World War II ended his sign painting, "as he couldn't buy paint or supplies."

Photographs taken at the time the interior of Myer Brothers was dismantled and moved to the museum, show the sign still displayed over the transom that ran the width of the store.

If you have ever looked closely at the sign—and

we hope you haveyou may have noticed and puzzled over marks underneath word "Bros." These are reminders of an outdoor clock that was installed on the store in April 1915 and gave the business their slogan "The Chime Clock Store." The clock had been removed before the store was acquired by the Shears. Its current location is unknown.




Spies & Space: Toys of the Cold War Era

James Bond, Star Trek, Legos, and Star Wars all share one thing in common—they are some of the most memorable American icons and toys of the Cold War Era. Starting on September 14, the Castle Museum will be displaying examples of these toys and more in a new traveling exhibit in Centennial Hall—Spies and Space: Toys of the Cold War Era.

Spies and Space, which comes to the museum from SuperMonsterCity!, focuses on celebrating "the joy of toys" and demonstrating how "iconic American fictional characters serve as an historical documentation of our creativity, reflect our changing values, and have impacted our culture across the [d]ecades." In particular, Spies and Space, looks at how international espionage and the space race impacted both US and Soviet popular culture during a period of heightened political tensions around these issues.

To celebrate the opening of *Spies and Space*, the museum is having both a collector talk and Cold War themed costume party on Saturday, September 14. The talk will be led by SuperMonsterCity! collector David Barnhill. He will discuss his lifelong passion for collecting toys, games, posters, packaging, film, and more, which all serve as the basis for SuperMonsterCity! traveling exhibits (beginning at 4:30 p.m.) Following Barnhill's discussion, guests are invited to join staff in Centennial Hall for the opening of *Spies and Space*, including drinks and light refreshments—costumes are strongly encouraged (and offer up a chance to show your creativity by showcasing your interest in everything Cold War from politics to toys to space!)
